New Coatesville Satellite Campus First For City

Offering Traditional & Accelerated Undergraduate / Graduate Business Programs

The city of Coatesville will officially have its first university when The Lincoln University – Coatesville begins classes Fall 2013.

In March, the Middles States Commission on Higher Education approved the University's plan to establish a satellite campus at the former Gordon Education Center at 351 Kersey Street. Initially courses will be offered during the evenings and weekends and as enrollment grows classes will move toward traditional as well as accelerated undergraduate and graduate degree Business programs.

"Once again, The Lincoln University claims another first with its expansion to the city of Coatesville," said Dr. Robert R. Jennings, university president. "The Lincoln University –Coatesville offers a great and convenient opportunity for a working adult, veteran or any other student who has already obtained an associate's or bachelor's degree in Business and wishes to further his or her professional career with an advanced degree."

Bet's Cousin Jeff And Other Hall Of Fame Lecture Panelists Challenge Students On Lifestyles & Future

BET's Jeff (Cousin Jeff) Johnson and a panel of experts challenged students to lead healthy lifestyles, avoid dating violence and develop entrepreneurial mindsets during the National Black College Alumni Hall of Fame Foundation, Inc.'s 2013 Legacy Lecture Series on Thursday, March 21 at the International Cultural Center (ICC).

The series, whose Lincoln theme is "Educating Student Leaders To Be Healthy, Wealthy And Wise," was underwritten by Wells Fargo, Delta Airlines, the Hall of Fame, Substance Abuse

and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) and the University.



"The biggest myth we often have regarding health is weight," said Fitness guru Andrea Riggs, who also led a workout with faculty, administration and students earlier that morning. "It's not about what you weigh. It's about health."

According to the Hall of Fame Foundation's website,

Legacy Lecture Series, whose impetus is to position students for leadership roles in society through education and mentoring, is designed to equip and empower students to overcome the economic, social cultural and political challenges of today, and to re-shape the fabric of America as they step into tomorrow. The Series is presented on various HBCU campuses throughout the academic year.

To date, the Hall of Fame has held its lecture series at Texas Southern in February, and had a third lecture scheduled at Virginia Union on April 17. At each event, cash prizes are awarded to students and a student group in attendance, including a \$250 book voucher and \$500 prize for the student organization with the most present.

Other Lincoln event panelists included Thomas W. Dortch, Jr., Hall of Fame Chairman of the Board, Jasmine Matthews, Miss Hall of Fame, Shannon Taitt, SAMHSA, and Sonya Dukes, Senior Vice President, Wells Fargo. Johnson served asmoderator. Whether it's food or alcohol, Taitt added that students typically overindulge on college campuses due to peer pressure and stress, making education and moderation key.

"We need to dispel the myth that alcohol or drugs gives you a certain attitude or certain swag," Taitt said. "We need to focus on self-esteem."

And lack of self-esteem is what often drives dating violence, promiscuity, STDs and unplanned pregnancies," the panelists agreed.

"Taitt explained that students needed to be "real" about what role drugs and alcohol play in their decisions and relationships. Johnson and others referenced the Steubenville, Ohio rape trial involving a drunken 16-year-old and two high school football players, and how young men need to police each other's behavior and how women must come forward about abuse. "We need to have our own conversations about what manhood looks like," Johnson said. "Where were the brothers that held these young men accountable?"

Dortch, the chairman and CEO of TWD, Inc. and a successful entrepreneur, also encouraged students to prepare for entrepreneurship regardless of their professions, by taking a business or marketing elective course, gaining experience, even unpaid, and ensuring that they possess integrity. "You'll never be paid what you're worth working for someone else," Dortch said. "They'll love you. They'll praise you, but they won't pay you."

Refining The Brand As 'The Lincoln University'

The nation's first Lincoln University hopes to end the confusion between that other institution in Missouri and those abroad as well as reclaim its former prestige with three simple letters.

The Office of Communications and Public Relations, in conjunction with the Office of the President, has officially refined the university's brand as 'The Lincoln University' and renamed The Graduate Center, 'The Lincoln University – University City.'

"We are the first Lincoln, the premier institution with the storied past and the unparalleled list of firsts among HBCUs and many other universities," said Dr. Robert R. Jennings, president of The Lincoln University. "We need to always be moving in that direction in all that we say and do to support those contentions."

The effort, part of the university's first-ever comprehensive, strategic communications and public relations plan, which is designed to increase name recognition and enhance the university's public image and perception. Over the years, the university and the media have frequently listed the institution's name inconsistently as 'Lincoln University,' 'Lincoln University of Pennsylvania,' and 'Lincoln University of the Commonwealth System.'

The newly-approved satellite campus in Coatesville will also follow the same name protocol as *'The Lincoln University – Coatesville'* when classes begin this fall.
