GRADS OF HISTORICALLY BLACK COLLEGES HAVE WELL-BEING EDGE

An article dated October 27, 2015 at www.gallup.com stated, "black HBCU grads are stronger in purpose and financial well-being," college experiences are different for grads from HBCUs as compared to grads from non-HBCUs, and "more black HBCU grads strongly agree they received support." In addition, the study reveals that,

HBCUS... are battling a number of challenges, including declining enrollment numbers and lower-than-average graduate and retention rates. Despite these challenges, a new Gallup study reveals that black graduates of HBCUs are more likely than black graduates of other institutions to be thriving – strong, consistent and progressing – in a number of areas of their lives, particularly in their financial purpose and well-being.
