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Take a trip down memory lane as we talk with different Residence Life alumni. Each month we will highlight a former RA or RC to learn about their experience.

Phillip Holmes is a former Residence Hall Coordinator at The Lincoln University.

What would you like to tell us about yourself? My name is Phillip Holmes and I am currently the Director of Housing and Residential Education at Delaware State University. I am originally from Aliquippa PA (near Pittsburgh GO STEELERS!) and attended the University of Tulsa (OK) on a full football scholarship. I received my Master's Degree from Arkansas Tech University. I have had the pleasure of moving around through my 18 years working within Student Affairs and have been to 6 Universities including 3 HBCU's. I have worked in such departments as Housing/Residence Life, Academic Support, Athletics, Career Services, and Recreation.

What year did you work in Residence Life? I worked at Lincoln University from August of 2004 to June 2006

What made you want to become an RC? Although I was not a RA while I was in college, I lived in the same suite as the RA and had the chance to experience the position through his eyes. I was an athlete (Football player) and at the time lived in an all athletic hall. The RA being much smaller than most people within the building, used to take me with him to confront residents breaking the rules! After college, I still wanted to help students and make an impact on that age group.



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What building(s) did you work in? I was hired to work in Frederick Douglass Hall and resided there for my two years as a RC. Before leaving, I was promoted to the Area Coordinator position and was responsible for several other buildings on campus.

What is your fondest memory here at Lincoln? The PRIDE displayed by not only the current students but also the alumni that came back annually. While walking on campus, it was not uncommon to hear someone yell "LU....Lincoln Pride" and I always remembered that sense of belonging established there.

How is Residence Life different now from when you worked for the department? I believe there is a larger sense of knowing that learning does not end in the classroom. More emphasis on programming and one on one interactions with residents have helped in the battle for retention. We are not just the "People with all the keys" but rather we are professionals that are an intricate part of the matriculation of a student.

How is your current role similar to when you were an RC? As Director of Housing and Residential Education at Delaware State University, the similarities are that the lessons learned during my time at Lincoln still play a big part in what I do today. Times were not always easy at Lincoln but I learned the valuable lesson that relationships are key. The relationships I built with students, professionals, parents and families all played a part in the growth of my residents and also my growth as a professional.






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Campus Infraction Data

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Housing Information

WE ARE STILL ACCEPTING ROOM DEPOSITS - PLEASE PAY THE BURSAR!!!

ASL & Single Room Requirements

- Students must have a 2.5 GPA or higher
- Students must be clear of judicial holds or infractions
- Students currently residing in a single or in ASL must meet requirements to retain residence
- Please note school scholarships do not cover the additional ASL cost
- Transfers students cannot start in ASL, they must obtain a Lincoln University GPA of 2.5 or better

Meals

- First year students will receive 19 meals per week which comes with 100 flex dollars per semester to be used at one of many campus eateries.
- Upperclassmen students will have the choice of 19 meals per week which comes with 100 flex dollars per semester or 14 meals per week which comes with 50 flex dollars per semester to be used at one of many campus eateries.
- You can add more flex dollars to your account
- After your ID is activated for the semester, you are not allowed to downgrade your meals from 19 to 14 per week
- If you pay your room deposit late, you may have your meal plan option chosen for you if you do not express a preference

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Editor's Column


"Suggested Reading for Any Professional" by Jonathan C. Harris
