BUDGET IMPASSE

Thank you to faculty, students, staff and alumni for taking time to contact your state representatives in support of the release of the state appropriations for Lincoln University for the 2015-16 fiscal year. Your voices have been heard.

On March 16, 2016, the House of Representatives finally reached the required twothirds vote and passed funding for the state-related universities-- Penn State, Pitt, Lincoln and the University of Pennsylvania in Senate Bills 913, 914, 915 and 916-and sent them to the Governor for his action.


We await his approval and signing of the bill that will allow us to receive funding for the University's 2015-2016 Budget. The passage of the vote is certainly an indication of the legislators' understanding of the importance of our institution and its impact on the lives of our students as well as other Pennsylvania constituencies.

THE COUNCIL OF INDEPENDENT COLLEGES (CIC)

The CIC is accepting applications for the 2016-2017 Woodrow Wilson Visiting Fellows program. The program makes it possible for a college or university to bring to campus, for several days, a distinguished public policy maker, journalist, artist, environmentalist, diplomat, business leader, or other non-academic expert for seminars, lectures, classes, and informal meetings with students and faculty groups. Visiting Fellows choose to participate in the program because they relish the opportunity to share their expertise with undergraduates. Students become better informed about the world and often learn more about professional fields, which may inform their post-graduation career plans.

Additional information about the program is available at www.cic.edu/VisitingFellows and includes biographical information about the expanding list of high-profile professionals who serve as Visiting Fellows. The fee of \$6,550 for a week-long residency has remained unchanged for seven years. The CIC pays the Fellow's honorarium, travel, and other incidental expenses, and the host campus provides local transportation, housing, and meals while the Fellow is in residence.
